INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

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To the Board of Directors of Truckers Against Trafficking:

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Truckers Against Trafficking (the "Organization"), which comprise the statement of financial position - modified cash basis as of December 31, 2020, and the related statements of activities, functional expense, and cash flows - modified cash basis for the year ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting described in Note 2; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error.

In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Organization's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control.

Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Truckers Against Trafficking as of December 31, 2020, and the change in net assets for the year then ended, in accordance with the basis of accounting as described in Note 2.

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 2 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to that matter.

Reporting on Summarized Comparative Information

We have previously audited the Organization's December 31, 2019, financial statements, and we expressed an unmodified audit opinion on those audited financial statements in our report dated July 24, 2020. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented herein as of and for the nine month period ended December 31, 2019, is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it has been derived.

Notes To Financial Statements For The Year Ended December 31, 2020

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(1) **Nature Of Organization**

Truckers Against Trafficking (the "Organization"), a not-for-profit corporation, that exists to educate, equip, empower, and mobilize members of the trucking and travel plaza industry to combat domestic sex trafficking.

(2) Summary Of Significant Accounting Policies

Method Of Accounting

The Organization's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the modified cash basis of accounting; consequently, contributions and other revenues are recognized when received rather than when promised or earned, and certain expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred.

Basis Of Accounting

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of *Financial Statements for Not-for-Profit Organizations*. Under this standard, the Organization is required to report information regarding financial position and activities according to the following net asset classifications:

Net assets without donor restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions and may be expended for any purpose in performing the primary objectives of the Organization. These net assets may be used at the discretion of the Organization's management and the Board of Directors.

Net assets with donor restrictions: Net assets subject to stipulations imposed by donors, and grantors. Some donor restrictions are temporary in nature; those restrictions will be met by actions of the Organization or by the passage of time. Other donor restrictions are perpetual in nature, where by the donor has stipulated the funds must be maintained in perpetuity.

Statement Of Cash Flows

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consists of checking and savings accounts.

Use Of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets

and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Fair Value Measurements

The Organization follows Fair Value Measurements which among other things requires enhanced disclosures about investments that are measured and reported at fair value and establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

- Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets Level 1 or liabilities in active markets that the Association has the ability to access.
- Inputs to the valuation methodology include: Level 2
 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
 - Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets:
 - Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
 - Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Certificates of deposit: The fair value of the certificates of deposit is based on amortized cost or original cost plus accrued interest.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the published net asset value (NAV) of the shares held at the reporting date.

Corporate bonds: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual investments are traded.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

In general, investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility risk. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of the investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the investment balances and the amounts reported in the statement of financial position.

The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position for cash and cash equivalents and accrued liabilities, approximate fair value because of the immediate or short-term maturities of these financial instruments.

Inventory

Inventory consisted of sales merchandise and is reflected at the lower of cost or net realizable value.

Property And Equipment

Property and equipment is stated at acquisition cost or, if donated, at its estimated fair market value at the date of the donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over estimated useful lives of 5 years. The Organization's capitalization policy is to capitalize purchases of assets with a useful life of more than one year and a cost of \$500 or more.

As of December 31, 2020, property and equipment amounted to \$40,000 and was fully depreciated.

Revenue And Revenue Recognition

The Organization recognizes revenue from contributions, government contracts and other revenue as the cash is received as on the modified cash basis of accounting.

Donated goods and services, which meet the criteria for recognition, are reflected as contributions in the accompanying statements at their estimated values at the date of receipt. During the year ended December 31, 2020, the Organization recorded donated goods and services in the amount of \$6,142 and \$42,043, respectively which are reflected in program services.

The accompanying financial statements do not reflect the estimated fair value of certain other donated goods and services that do not meet the criteria for recognition.

Methods Used for Allocation of Expenses from Management and General Activities

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributable to one or more program or supporting functions of the Organization. Costs not directly attributable to a function, including salaries, payroll taxes, and related benefits, insurance, communications, supplies and equipment, staff development, and utilities are allocated to a functional region based on time and effort.

Risks and Uncertainties

The global community has been under a significant threat from coronavirus ("COVID-19"). The extent to which the COVID-19 pandemic impacts the Organization's business, results of operations and financial condition will depend on future developments, which are still uncertain and cannot be predicted. Even after the COVID-19 pandemic has subsided, the Organization may continue to experience adverse impacts to its business as a result of any economic recession or depression that has occurred or may occur in the future. Therefore, the Organization cannot reasonably estimate the impact at this time.

Evaluation of Subsequent Events

The Organization has performed an evaluation of subsequent events through April 8, 2021, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, and has considered any relevant matters in the preparation of the financial statements and footnotes.

(3) <u>Tax Exempt Status</u>

The Organization has previously received notice from the Internal Revenue Service of exemption from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements contain no provision for income taxes. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509(a)(1).

The Organization follows the Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes accounting standard which requires the Organization to determine whether a tax position (and the related tax benefit) is more likely than not to be sustained upon examination by the applicable taxing authority, based solely on the technical merits of the position. The tax benefit to be recognized is measured as the largest amount of benefit that is greater than fifty percent likely of being realized upon settlement, presuming that the tax position is examined by the appropriate taxing authority that has full knowledge of all relevant information. During the year ended December 31, 2020, the Organization's management evaluated its tax positions to determine the existence of uncertainties, and did not note any matters that would require recognition or which may have an affect on its tax-exempt status.

The Organization is no longer subject to U.S. federal tax audits on its Form 990 by taxing authorities for years ending prior to 2017. The years subsequent to this year contain matters that could be subject to differing interpretations of applicable tax laws and regulations. Although the outcome of tax audits is uncertain, the Organization believes no issues would arise.

(4) <u>Investments And Concentration Of Credit Risk</u>

The Organization's cash demand deposits and certificates of deposit are held at financial institutions at which deposits are insured up to \$250,000 by the FDIC. As of December 31, 2020, the Organization's cash demand deposits exceeded the FDIC's insurance limit by \$794,979.

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(5) Liquidity And Available Of Financial Asset

The Organization has assets of \$1,867,931 available within one year of the statement of financial position date for general expenditure

(6) Loan Payable

On April 7, 2020, the Organization qualified for and received a loan pursuant to the Paycheck Protection Program, a program implemented by the U.S. Small Business Administration under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, from a qualified lender, for an aggregate principal amount of \$173,232 (the "PPP Loan"). The PPP Loan bears interest at a fixed rate of 1.0% per annum, with the first six months of interest deferred, has a term of five years, and is unsecured and guaranteed by the U.S. Small Business Administration. Subsequent to year end, the principal amount of the PPP Loan was forgiven under the Paycheck Protection Program and will be recognized as revenue in fiscal year 2021.

(7) **Employee Benefit Plan**

Effective January 1, 2019, the Organization established a simplified employee pension plan (the "Plan") covering substantially all employees. Contributions are based on percentage of the eligible employee's annual salary which is approved by the Board of Directors on an annual basis. Contributions to the Plan during the year ended December 31, 2020, amounted to \$20,726.
